Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) is a popular way for consumers to buy local seasonal food directly from a farmer.

A farmer decides on the number of shares" he will make available to the public. Consumers then purchase these shares and in return, they are given a percentage of seasonal produce for the set timeframe. Depending on the farm there may be more than one type of share available.

Advantages for the Farmer:

- Early marketing of product
- Receive payment early
- In person interaction with the people eating his product

Advantages for the Consumer:

- Eat ultra-fresh, flavorful, local produce
- Exposed to new, great-tasting vegetables
- Develop a rapport with the farmer who is growing for them.

What we Grow

Broccoli, Chard, Herbs, Lettuce Potatoes, Tomatoes, Cabbage, Cucumber, Kale, Onions, Radishes, Turnips, Cantaloupe, Green Beans, Peas, Spinach, Watermelon, Swiss Chard, Carrots, Greens, Kohlrabi, Peppers, Squash, Beets

The CSA at Penn Farm runs for 10 weeks, June 18 - August 20

A share will on average be enough vegetables for a family of 4 each week.
